
Synod Sunday!

Quoting our primary end (goal), "As part of the Body of Christ, the Synod of the Trinity, through the responsible use of shared resources, supports and challenges member Presbyteries to be vital, innovative and faithful in their collaborative and distinctive callings." We work hand-in-hand with the ministry and mission of our presbyteries as they seek to support the witness of congregations, to the end that the church throughout its region becomes a community of faith, hope, love and witness.

How do we do that? Another good question. The Synod supports presbytery leadership by offering training, networking and continuing education opportunities. We also annually award grants for mission travel, new initiatives in ministry, and promoting justice and righteousness.

Rev. Michael Wilson, the stated clerk at the Presbytery of Donegal, was elected the Synod's new stated clerk last fall and began serving in 2023.



Four presbytery executives retire as regions begin new chapters

In the last year, the executive presbyters in Pittsburgh, Carlisle, West Virginia and Northumberland retired, leaving those regions with new leadership plans as they head into the fall.

- Sheldon Sorge retired as general minister of Pittsburgh Presbytery at the end of 2022. Brian Wallace is currently the acting head of staff.
- In Carlisle, Cheryl Galan retired in May after 4 ½ years as the interim executive presbyter. The presbytery's new staffing model now features two full-time presbytery leaders.



Steve Cureton is retiring from Northumberland at the end of August. Two part-time transitional executives will fill the vacancy.
